 - i. The Facilitator provided an overview of meeting protocol for online participation
 - The Facilitator introduced CPWG Co-chairs Michael Hickey and Patrick Daily
 - b. Co-Chairs
 - i. Co-chair Michael Hickey provided an overview of the meeting agenda
- II. <u>Settlement Update Michael Hickey</u>
 - a. Michael Hickey read a statement from Attorney Steve Schwartz
 - i. Fairness Hearing was held on 2/2/22 The Judge issued a decision and Order Approving the Settlement on February 4, 2022.
 - ii. The timeline established allows 30 days for an appeal to be filed
 - iii. Once the effective date occurs, which is March 5, the settling defendants have ten days to fund the rest of the settlement (a preliminary fund had been created to pay for the administration, thus far).
 - iv. The General Administrator is currently processing claims for eligibility and appropriate documentation.

- 1. If any claims are deficient, the General Administrator will contact the claimant by email and regular mail and seek any missing information.
- Until all such deficiencies are cured or the claims rejected because they couldn't be cured, there can be no distribution of the proceeds as the division of the amount among the claimants can only occur once the list of eligible claimants is final.
- 3. At present, payments for property devaluation and Nuisance are expected to begin by late April or early May.

- c. What the study involves:
 - i. Adults and children in Newburgh and Hoosick Falls will be invited to participate if they meet eligibility requirements.
 - ii. Study team plans to enroll 1,000 adults and 300 children.
 - iii. If eligible, adults and children will attend a one-time clinic visit. They will give a blood sample, a urine sample, and answer a health questionnaire.
 - iv. Children will also complete cognitive and behavioral screenings (possibly on a return visit).
 - v. All participants will receive a results report and reimbursement for each portion of the clinic visit they complete.

d. Eligibility

- i. An adult aged 18 years or older who
 - Lived in Newburgh or the Hoosick Falls area and used drinking water with documented PFAS contamination between 2005 and March 2016 in the Hoosick Falls area OR between 2005 and May 2016 in the City of Newburgh

- 2. Were exposed through drinking water
- 3. Were not exposed through environment or occupation
 - Worked as firefighter; trained as firefighter using AFFF foam
 - b. Worked at an industrial facility that used PFAS chemicals in the manufacturing process
- ii. A child aged 4 through 17 years who has parent or guardian's permission and
 - Lived in Newburgh or Hoosick Falls and used drinking water with documented PFAS contamination between 2005 and March 2016 in the Hoosick Falls area OR between 2005 and May 2016 in the City of Newburgh
 - 2. Was born to and/or breastfed by a mother that meets the adult eligibility criteria

e. Recruitment

- i. Potential participants will be asked to contact our study staff and complete an eligibility screen.
- ii. Invitation letters will be in English, Spanish, and Haitian Creole in Newburgh and Hoosick Falls, if needed.
- iii. To finalize enrollment and schedule a clinic visit, participants are asked to call (833)-732-7697.
- iv. Staff will also follow up with those that have received invitations.
- f. Clinic appointments
 - i. Once an appointment is scheduled, study team will mail a clinic appointment packet

 - a. In addition to the main study, the New York Site will ask for consent to collect an additional blood sample and to receive access to stored blood samples from the DOH biomonitoring program

 - Urine samples will be stored until lab methods are developed and the scientific evidence shows which PFAS tests will yield useful results

g. Clinic visits

- i. For <u>Adults</u>, the clinic visit will last approximately 1.5 hours and include the following:
 - 1. Sign-in
 - 2. Urine sample drop off
 - 3. Height and weight measurements
 - 4. Blood pressure check
 - 5. Blood sample collection
 - 6. Questionnaire completion, including residential, work, and medical history

- ii. For <u>Children</u>, the clinic visit will also include a neurobehavioral assessment, lasting 1.5 to 2 hours. This can be scheduled on a different day, if needed. It will include:
 - 1. Memory games
 - 2. Sorting items
 - 3. Solving puzzles
- iii. We will also ask for consent to access medical and school records
- h. Clinic results
 - i. We will send samples to a lab to analyze for PFAS levels and health measures.
 - ii. We will mail a lab report with blood results, including the following for both adults and children:
 - 1. Cholesterol
 - 2. Thyroid hormones and sex hormones (in children)
 - 3. Kidney function
 - 4. Immune system
 - 5. Liver enzymes
 - 6. Lead, mercury, manganese, and cadmium levels (New York Site only)
 - iii. The report will also include urine analysis, including:

 - 2. Kidney function

 - Comment: The village has had discussion with parties involved and welcomes an agreement to benefit the community for years to come, including the coverage of costs beyond the June 2022 date in the current agreement and all reasonable costs covered well beyond the standard superfund that lasts 30 years.
 - 1. Comment: The riverside property does not have river access and has many issues. The companies' obligation is to close the site, not redevelop it. The Army Corp of Engineers has a levy there and it is not an easy process to work with them/very complex. The village would like to make it look more attractive and give it some curb appeal but has other priorities and no funding source to redevelop the property; repurposing would take a long time.

Response: A closure plan must be completed by responsible parties and a draft of the plan includes asphalt or vegetative cover. Prior to site construction activities, residents and village officials will be informed of the project through factsheets and door hangers for those in close proximity to the site.

VI. Other Hoosick Area CPWG Business

- a. Hoosick Rising, Marrianne Zwicklbaur effects on the business community
 - i. Information is continually getting out that the local water is safe
 - 1. Business owners have minimal concerns, believe water is safe
 - ii. Business owners look forward to people coming to town and are trying to figure out how to get people to come to, or move to, Hoosick Falls
 - iii. Need to keep getting information out that they have a great filtration system
 - iv. New people in town never ask about the water many are coming from bigger cities where they never knew what was in their water
 - v. Local real estate is doing well, very few homes on the market
 - vi. Local press is an issue
 - Hoosick Rising wrote a letter to the local paper about positive perceptions in the business community and never received a response
 - 2. Had a long conversation with the Times Union and expressed positive perceptions nothing was ever printed
 - 3. A journalist/food writer reviewed Bistro42 (and a few other restaurants) and wrote a great article about the area
